


Overheard On The Green

Camden Bowling Club was one of the strongest clubs in the district'.

We all know that Bob Pinkerton was a great bowler, but what was he like as a person?

Bob was a gentleman's gentleman on and off the green. But, when he played he was totally focused on the job. On his bowls his logo was a pink curtain – 'pinkerton', get it. He was a great man. Bob loved to teach anyone who wanted to learn. He nurtured many young kids and many learners and had time for them all'.

As Peter was telling me his story, I noticed that for a brief moment the passion and love for his beloved Camden Club was there again.
