History of Bowls
Discovery of the Biased Bowl
Have you ever wondered how the 'bias' in the bias bowl eventuated? Well, according to 'The Bowls News' printed in 1958 this is one version on how it happened.
On 31 March, 1522 (Henry VIII time) a game between skip Charles Brandon and John Richard brought about this discovery. During this era lawn bowls were turned from oak and were perfectly round and $51 / 2$ in in diameter Games were largely played with four bowlers on each side of the competition and the lanes were called rinks.
This historic game was played at Goole, Yorkshire, England. In a fours game, Rink 1 composed of skippers Charles Brandon and his opponent was skip John Richard. Up to the $15^{\text {th }}$ end, the games stood about even.

In the $16^{\text {th }}$ end, John Richard's team had one bowl about 6 in in front of the jack, and when it came to Brandon's turn to bowl, he made a vigorous running shot. When his bowl hit the opponent's bowl, which was in the way, Brandon's bowl split in half.
Brandon ran to the nearest house and with a borrowed handsaw, amputated the nearly round top from the post at the foot of the banister, then with a few easy touches with his sword, quickly had the rough spot where the disc should be smoothed out.
With his new bowl ready for action, and not knowing that the new bowl was not absolutely round, he was ready for his second shot. This, at first, seemed very unfortunate to him, for he bowled it in the usual way, in a straight line and, of course, the biased banister-postbowl went off several feet to one side.
In the next end, he allowed for this bias and his new-found bias-bowl went out and around all other bowls on to the green and came in for shot. This he also prepared on the $18^{\text {th }}$, $19^{\mathrm{th}}, 20^{\mathrm{th}}$, and $21^{\text {st }}$ ends, and won the game by four points and discovered that the biased bowl could win against a perfectly round bowl.
After the game, it was not long before all bowlers had their bowls turned a little smaller on one side. Believe it or not and the rest they say is history.
