MEMBER PROFILE – PHIL SPENCER

At eighty-five years of age Phil Spencer still has crystal clear recollections of the big and colourful players and characters in whose company he has graced the greens.

Born in Albury and growing up around the state as his father was posted to different communities in his work as a radio technician, Phil proved himself an accomplished athlete in all sports playing hockey, rugby and cricket.

As a schoolboy he was picked to play at the Sydney cricket ground in the curtain raiser of the 1951 France - Australia Rugby League Test with Clive Churchill captain of the Australia side and Puig Aubert full back for France. He was the seventh boy to step onto the bus in Goulburn when the headmaster came out and told them the match was called off due to so much rain making the ground too muddy for the city schoolboys to play. It would have been normal conditions for the country boys.

Leaving school Phil took up hockey and was picked to play for NSW in the under 21 side. In those days the players were only presented with an embroidered badge. They had to buy their own uniform and pay expenses and his family couldn't afford it so he had to decline. Throughout his career, he saw many potential state and national players not progress due to lack of funding.

During his time with hockey Phil played with guys who went to the Olympics. Before the 1960 Rome Olympics Goulburn held a fundraising night for team members Desmond





Spackman and 'Sluggo' Mills at which they were given several hockey sticks to take with them.

Moving to Camden Phil played first grade cricket for Camden and was picked from B grade straight into the district side. He won six caps out of seven years in A grade for Camden but had to give it away due to back problems.

He then took up bowls in 1965 at age 26 along with the 32-year-old Mal Smith. They were the youngest players in the club by 40 years and met considerable resistance from the older members who did not want young people playing 'their' sport.

Phil used to practise every day having a roll before boarding the bus to the coal mine where he worked for 29 years. He also spent time as a foreman in a produce store situated opposite the current saleyards at the north end of town where McDonalds now stands.

During all his many years on the green his pick of players for the best were Bob Pinkerton (the current Michael Pinkerton's grandfather) Nev Sharp and Jim Knapman. They were good bowlers and great blokes.

Phil Spencer was the only Camden Bowler to play lead, second, third and Skip in Grade 1 for the club as well as for the Southern Tablelands District. He was also selected in teams representing Zone 5.

When playing for Southern Tablelands against Sydney Metropolitan he was appalled at the crawling and bootlicking of the city players hoping for a berth in the State side when Roger Moore, chairman of state selectors strolled through the gate. He knew he would never get picked in a state side if you had to lower yourself to those levels.

He fondly remembers being a member of the Camden Grade 1 Pennant side when they were runners up in the 1981 State finals. He is the only surviving member of that memorable team. In those days Camden could have had five or six state players but for prejudice and funding.

Phil's team of himself, Bob Pinkerton, Leo Vegus, and Mal Smith won the State Champion of Champions Fours at North Manly when every opposition team included state or national players. A championship team will always beat a team of champions he declared.

He also won the South Pacific Fours with Bob Pinkerton, the Zone Under 45's Fours and skipped the winning team in the Southern Tablelands Fours. He played for STDBA against other Districts and Metropolitan on many occasions.

To put something back into the game that gave him so much satisfaction Phil served as Selector and Chairman of Selection for the Southern Tablelands District and gave of his knowledge and experience as a coach. His most notable students being Kevin Harris and Guy Wilton. He oversaw coaching for school kids and was pleased with the discipline the teachers had over their charges in those days.

Phil served three terms as welfare officer visiting hospitals at Camden, St Vincents, Liverpool, Westmead and Campbelltown. In those days you were not paid. Over the years he served on the Committee, Selection and Flood Committees. He raised many thousands of









dollars from supporters and organisations outside of bowls on behalf of the Two Hundred Club.

He has always assisted around the club whenever a need has arisen.

Phil Spencer's fondest memories of his days with Camden Bowling Club are his Life Membership and the naming of the Phil Spencer Green.

4 TACTICS TO RAISE YOUR COMPETITIVENESS

In order to become a more competitive and versatile bowler, I encourage you to approach purposeful practice sessions with these 4 game tactics in mind;

1 – Minimum Length Jacks

Jack lengths that bowlers typically neglect to practise tend to be either minimum or maximum lengths, or both. The vast majority of bowlers tend to practice medium length jacks on a regular basis, which leads to opportunities for the more purposeful bowler to fine tune their minimum jack length skills and create a competitive advantage. Going into the start of a game when neither opponent has any game tactic, the first few ends are typically medium length jacks, which becomes the default length for the rest of the game. I find that players may be trapped in battling it out to see who 'picks up' that length the best, rather than playing to their strengths. Sometimes as a player you may not even realise that this is occurring. What if your opponent's main weakness was minimum length jacks and you didn't exploit this to your advantage; you might have won that game with ends to spare instead of it coming down to the last bowl or the last end to win the game.

2 - Maximum Length Jacks

Even if you are not an expert at maximum length jacks, you can still use them to your advantage while you hone your skills. Usually with maximum jack lengths you can score even if you have not 'nailed' the jack, with heads generally more open and allowing you more room to







play the winning shot. With purposeful practice sessions focused on this game tactic, you will become confident in your maximum length ability which can give you a competitive edge, compared to the majority of bowlers who tend to stick to the default medium length jacks during practice sessions and competition.

Maximum length ends also bring into play the element of the ditch. This can also exploit an opponent's weakness if they are constantly overweight with their shots, or their inability to ditch draw if the jack ends up in the ditch.



3 - Mat Position

For me, this is one of the key elements overlooked by an 'average' bowler and used to great effect by 'elite' bowlers. All too often you see many bowlers position the matt for the next end at the location the previous end has finished, possibly saving them from kicking bowls back. How is consistency with the line achieved, when the mat position fluctuates depending on the previous end length? Being consistent and precise with mat position can help to build momentum in your favour, one less variable you have to contend with when trying to pick that winning line. Mat position can also be used to disrupt an opponent's flow. Moving the mat forward or back even just a few meters can off-









put your opponent and give you that little more space to make the winning shot.

TBA TIP – Don't be afraid to significantly move the mat position on end 1!! This could really set a different tone for the game from the get-go and will make for an interesting reaction possibly from your opponent. With the majority of first ends starting with the mat position near the 'T' it adds an element of psychology to the game tactics by not allowing your opponent to settle into their 'default' position.

4 - Jack Position

The jack position is obviously dictated by the end length that you want to play and potentially the mat position also. However, an important factor to remember with jack position is the ability to 'kill' an end or not 'kill' an end. If a strength of yours is the drive shot, it may be in your favour to play a short jack in order to have the option of 'killing' and replaying the end. Having the jack position near the 'T' will drastically reduce your ability to 'kill' an end with the jack ultimately ending up in the ditch. This tactic could also be used in your favour, by positioning the jack near the 'T' and not allowing your opponent to constantly 'kill' ends to get themselves out of trouble.

Game plans can not only be utilised in an attacking sense, but also as a defensive tool. By incorporating these four game tactics into your practice sessions, they can help you become a more competitive and versatile bowler on the green. Being confident in your ability to be able to play various length jacks for your own advantage and recognising when to implement and change overall game tactics, can be the difference in coming out on top.






NERSING STUFF

This is a Tesla model Y battery. It takes up all of the space under the passenger compartment of the car. To manufacture it you need:

- --12 tons of rock for Lithium (can also be extracted from sea water)
- -- 5 tons of cobalt minerals (Most cobalt is made as a byproduct of processing copper and nickel ores. It is the most difficult and expensive material to obtain for a battery.)
- -- 3 tons nickel ore
- -- 12 tons of copper ore

You must move 250 tons of soil to obtain:

- -- 26.5 pounds of Lithium
- -- 30 pounds of nickel
- -- 48.5 pounds of manganese
- -- 15 pounds of cobalt

To manufacture the battery also requires:

- -- 441 pounds of aluminium, steel and/or plastic
- -- 112 pounds of graphite

The Caterpillar 994A is used to move the earth to obtain the minerals needed for this battery. The Caterpillar consumes 264 gallons of diesel in 12 hours.

The bulk of necessary minerals for manufacturing the batteries come from China or Africa. Much of the labour in Africa is done by children. When you buy an electric car, China profits most.

The 2021 Tesla Model Y OEM battery (the cheapest Tesla battery) is currently for sale on the Internet for \$4,999 not including shipping or installation. The battery weighs 1,000 pounds (you can imagine the shipping cost). The cost of Tesla batteries are:

Model 3 -- \$14,000+ (Car MSRP \$38,990)

Model Y -- \$5,000-\$5,500 (Car MSRP \$47,740)

Model S -- \$13,000-\$20,000 (Car MSRP \$74,990)







Model X -- \$13,000+ (Car MSRP \$79,990)

It takes 7 years for an electric car to reach net-zero CO2. The life expectancy of the battery is 10 years (average). Only in the last 3 years do you start to reduce your carbon footprint, but then the batteries must be replaced and you lose all gains made. And finally, my new friend, Michael, made some excellent points: I forgot to mention the amount of energy required to process the raw materials and the amount of energy used to haul these batteries to the U.S. sometimes back and forth a couple of times. But by all means, get an electric car. Just don't sell me on how awesome you are for the environment. Or for human rights.

Johnno Johnstone, the deep-sea diver who walked 43km of the Bass Strait seabed



Johnno Johnstone was known to say that he was the only man to walk across Bass Strait.

He didn't actually cover the entire 500-kilometre distance but he did walk — and at times was bounced and dragged — for 43 kilometres across the sea floor that separates Tasmania from the Australian mainland.

It was 1938, global war was in the wind, and the only communications link between Victoria and Tasmania — a telecommunications cable across the strategically important Bass Strait — had been damaged.







All that was known was that the cable was damaged somewhere between King Island and Victoria.

John Edward Johnstone OBE, who preferred to be known as Johnno Johnstone, was an accomplished deep-sea diver from the United Kingdom and was based in Devonport in Tasmania at the time.

His six weeks of diving in the Strait required incredible bravery, nerve and some ingenious improvisation.

Johnstone spent so much time underwater that he befriended a family of fur seals — a side story revealing his great love of nature but not blessed with a happy ending.

Johnstone walked, hopped and skied along the bottom of the Strait, and often sat on a large hook that was towed by the ship.

He simultaneously lifted the cable just above the sea floor where he could check it for damage.







The Bass Strait Maritime Centre (BSMC) in Devonport has a deep-sea diving suit on display much like that worn by Johnstone on his expedition.

"This is a suit very similar to what Johnno wore and a very similar diving helmet as well," said Sarah Mae Beckett, the BSMC project officer.

The displayed diving suit recently played a role in the resurfacing of Johnstone's story.

"We run a monthly program called Vino and the Visual," Ms Beckett said.

"It's an art class run by local artist Elysium Greene but also a way to get people engaging with the many items hidden in our collection.

"When we focused on the suit it led to learning more about the Bass Strait walk and we found some photos of Johnno. It just struck us what an incredible story it is."

From salvaging gold to exploring Bass Strait

Looking deeper into Johnstone's life revealed that his ground-breaking Bass Strait dive was not even the most amazing, or dangerous, of his achievements.

In 1941, he led a gold salvage dive on RMS Niagara which had been sunk in 134 metres of water off Whangarei in New Zealand.

"He salvaged 555 gold ingots from that great depth, valued then at 2.7 million pounds," Ms Beckett said.

Johnstone was born in Liverpool in the UK in 1892, the son of a warehouseman.

He worked in shipyards and shipping and then the Royal Navy's salvage section before moving to Melbourne in 1919.

"He was working for the Marine Board in Tasmania, a lot in the Mersey [River], when the cable was damaged in Bass Strait," Ms Beckett said.

"He heard that someone would have to walk on the bottom of Bass Strait so he rang the office and said 'who's going to do that?'

"And they just said 'you are'."





Sharks, octopuses, and a 76kg suit

On being commissioned, Johnstone contracted friend Captain Harry Burgess and his wooden ship, Julie Burgess, to act as mothership.

An engineer installed a phone system that ran cables from Johnstone's helmet back to the ship — real-time communication was going to be vital.

In his book, Johnno The Deep Sea Diver, Johnstone wrote:

We set off to a little place called Naracoopa, on King Island.

The engineer (in charge of the booster station there) ... warned that there were sharks and octopi in these waters, but by then this did not alarm me.

Johnstone and the crew first dragged a hook over the sea bottom to locate the cable.

Over six weeks he followed the cable along the sea floor in his heavy suit.

He was repeatedly lifted 2–3 metres above the sea floor by waves at the surface and dropped back to the seabed.

It was exhausting but sometimes he could cover up to a kilometre in an hour. At other times, currents would keep him from getting anywhere.

Johnstone reported stunning visibility and lamented that he had no camera.

A camera housing was hastily dispatched from Melbourne, allowing Johnstone to successfully photograph the damage to the cable when he located it.

Adopted by fur seals

One day Johnstone was circled all day by a family of seals — parents with a pup.

In his book he wrote that he felt like they had adopted him:

My family were there each day ... waiting to welcome me and keep me company ... the crew of the boat flung them fish which they leapt for and caught in the air.

Then one day the parents were gone and just the pup, who he had named Percy, remained.

He remained faithful for a time and then he disappeared too:







Percy and I had some special moments together. When I stopped to decompress, he would come close enough for me to tickle his nose with a finger.

Sometime after ... I was strolling along a beach on the island (King) and found the body of a young seal washed up ... it had a deep gash in its side and half its head was gone.

Was it Percy? I couldn't be sure, but it looked very much like my little playmate.

Johnstone eventually retired in Victoria and died in a nursing home in Frankston in 1976.
